THE CIGARMAKERS' UNION. Organizer Charles F. Setb Gives Some

Interesting Figures Concerning It. This morning a reporter of the INTELLI-GENCER ran across Charles F. Seib, of Chicago, organizer for the Cigarmakers' International Union, who will speak in Sherts' hall this evening to members of the local union, with a view to strengthening the organization in this city.

Mr. Seib gave the reporter some interesting figures in regard to the Interna-In 1877 it had but seventeen local Unions with a membership of 1,000. At present there are 279 locals with 20,000 members The international president estimates the gain in wages to members of the union in the past four years to be \$150,000 per month; or \$1,800,000 yer year, and by pre venting reductions in wages about \$500

On account of the stringent laws of the Union in regard to strikes and lockouts, over 200 strikes have been prevented in the

In case of a lockout the union pays \$1 a week benefit and \$5 in case of sickness. In case of death the benefit is \$50 for one year, \$200 for five years and \$550 for ten years. In ten years the union has paid out the following: Strike benefits, \$421,291.30; ick benefits, \$260,265.63; death benefits, \$47,563; traveling benefits, \$263,401.20.
