His pockets contained three ives, two pocket combs, one key, a foot rule, metallic match box, combination glass and can opener, a gimlet and a few antis, also a clipping from a paper called "Knights of the Golden Eagle" giving an account of that order. He had a piece of an outline wrapped several times around his oft hand with a piece about 8 feet long stached. It is supposed that he was fish-ng an outline in rapid water and fell out of his boat, hanging to the outline until drowned.
