Billmeyer & Small Lose Nearly All Their Logs-Property at Columbia Moved From the Banks of the River.

COLUMBIA, June 1 .- The Susquehanne river at this place is very high and is still on the rise. All the wharves along the river front are covered with water and from Walnut street to Bruner's coal yards the river track is covered. The owners of boats have put their craft in safe places and several boat houses are almost sub-merged. Clepper's sand digging machine was anchored some distance from shore, but was removed to the coal chutes this orning after considerable work. The ice houses are almost surrounded with water. The river has a very threatening appearance. The tracks between Columbia and Perryville are reported all right.

About 6 o'clock this morning a fleet of about sixty-five rafts owned by Billmeyer & Small, of York, broke loose from their fastenings, along the York county shore above Wrightsville. About twenty raffs lodged along the bridge piers, but the balance of the timber went down the river. A man living at Wrightsville stated that he saw 25 rafts go over the dam at one time. Some of the timber crashed into a lime boat in the course, causing it to sink. The steamer "Wrightsville" is jammed along the wharf by the logs. The water is over the towpath and five canal boats are now lying along on the tow path.

A large quantity of timber is floating down the river. Nothing of any consequence has occurred about town as yet, but if the river continues rising some damage will be done.

The tow path and bank of the canal at Chickies Creek has been washed away, The water is within four feet of the big bridge, but it is not considered in danger. All of the seines and canoes and many of the cabins of the fishermen have been washed away.

Salled a Burning Steamer 2,300 Miles. The Baltimore American publishes to-day a letter from Captain Thomas Robert-son, of the steamer Hawkhurst, a British vessel, which details the thrilling experivessel, which details the thrilling experi-ence of the master and crew while en route from London to Rio Janeiro. On the 23d of March, while in latitude 11 degrees N., longitude 27 degrees W., dense volumes of smoke came out of the hold. The ventilators were at once blocked and holes made in the decks. Water and steam were poured in, but the flames seemed to have fastened on the cargo in the lower hold. During the four days the decks were red-hot. In the cargo were 700 barrels of oil tallow. The fifth day the port bunkers took fire and they burned for the seven days inter-vening before port was reached. The dis-tance traveled in this time was 2,300 miles. In recognition of the good seamanship and bravery of Captain Robertson, the emperor of Brazil wrote him a letter and decorated him with a medal of the first class,

A BIG BREAK.
