MARONEY AND McDONALD'S HABEAS CORPUS CASE BEFORE A NEW YORK JUDGE. The Argument of Their Counsel Against Authorizing the Men to the Chicago Authorities—Decision Reserved.

New York, June 15.—Judge Andrews to-day heard arguments upon the writs of habeas corpus in the cases of Maroney and McDonald, charged with complicity in the Cronin murder, and who were committed and held at the request of the Chicago authorities.

Not Moving Hastily. CHICAGO, June 15.—The special grand jury in the Cronin case began its fourth day's session this morning and indications are that several days yet will be consumed ere the jury is prepared to make its final report.

Trainsmen Accused. DUBLIN, June 15.—At Arrmah to-day four employes of the Sunday school excursion train which was wrecked near Arrmah on Wednesday, with fatal results, were arraigned in court and charged with felonious killing.

Refuse to Play. BALTIMORE, June 15.—The strike of the six Louisville base players continues, and it is unlikely that they will play this afternoon. The Colonels not wishing to inconvenience the local management and recognizing their mistake in not being in readiness to play yesterday, at the conference this noon offered to play if Manager Davidson will remit the \$100 fine each for non-appearance.

Beaver's Proclamation. HARRISBURG, June 15.—To-day Governor Beaver issued a proclamation in answer to the request of the State Board of Health, which made an official report declaring the drift in the Conemaugh river, at Johnstown and at other points in and about said locality a public nuisance.

Simons, of Colorado, consul general at St. Petersburg; Geo. W. Roosevelt, of Pennsylvania, consul at Brussels; Levi W. Brown, of Ohio, consul at Glasgow.

Down the Potomac. WASHINGTON, June 15.—The president and Secretaries Blaine and Windom went down the Potomac river this morning in Postmaster General Wannamaker's yacht Restless. The vessel will go down as far as Chesapeake bay, and lie at anchor during Monday, and return to Washington on Monday.

Murder and suicide. BROWNsville, Texas, June 15.—At the military post of Santa Maria on Thursday night Corporal A. J. Hutchings and Private Paul Marquand, of the Third Cavalry, while on their way back from a ball, had a quarrel which resulted in Hutchings shooting Marquand fatally, after which he blew his own brains out.
