DEATH OF ABRAHAM COLLINS.

THE CAREER OF ONE OF THE WEALTHIEST NEN IN THE COUNTY ENDED.

sis the Cause of His Death-A Briefsketch of His Life-A Tobacco Merchant Many Years.

Abraham Collins, one of Lancaster county's prominent citizens, died at his residence in Marietta this morning between 10 and 11 o'clock, in his 72d year. He was confined to the house for the past two weeks with pneumonia and that disease was the cause of his death. He had not been well for some weeks, having contracted a cold in the spring, while superin-tending the crection of a large roller pro-cess flouring mill, and this cold finally re-

The deceased had an interesting history He was born on July 12th. 1817, in York county but spent the greater portion of his life in Lancaster county. He was the youngest of tweive children, and his father died when he was a mere boy. At the early age of twelve years, when the canal being constructed in the vicinity of Marietta he was employed to carry water to the bands. A few years later although but a boy he could do a man's work and worked in the neighborhood of Marietia as a laborer. He was close in his hubits and nanaged to save the greater portion of his corniugs.

When he had accumulated sufficient to hire a caual boat he did so and for a time he followed that occupation. He prospered in this business and was soon the owner of a boat and he kept on at this business until he owned a fleet of boats. He purchased some property at what is now known as Collins' Station (having been named after him) and opened a general store for sup-plies for boatmen. This business grew so repidly that he had to give, it his whole personal attention. He still kept his fleet of boats on the canal, but left the management of that department to one of his representatives.

He was prominently identified with many important industries in that section of the state for the past quarter of a century. For eighteen years he was president of the First National bank of Marietta, and only resigned that position a few years ago. He was a large stockholder in the Columbia National bank and other financial insti-

Of late he has been a heavy dealer in least obacco and had several warchouses at Marietta and Collins' Station.

In polities he was a Democrat and was frequently a delegate to Democratic county conventions. He also represented his district in state conventions and was the nomince for state senator in the Northern district against John M. Stehman in 1886. The only order to which he belonged was

the Masonic, having been a member of the Harrisburg lodge. He was a member of the Marietta Presbyterian church.

He leaves surviving him his wife, whose maiden name was Elizabeth Karnhause, to whom he was married 51 years ago, and the following children: Mrs Mary Wheeler, whe of Roy, J. M. Wheeler; Miss Sallie Collins, at home; Mrs. E nma Haldeman, wife of Prof. Haldeman, of Westfield, Mass.; Mrs. Ida Hegener, wife of G. Edwin Hegener, assistant postmuster : Simon Collins and Miss Alice Collins, at home. His oldest daughter, the wife of Samuel Eby, of Elizabethtown, died some time ago, and leaves two children.

Mr. Collins is reported to be very rich. He is the owner of a thousand acres of land Is Lancaster county, in addition to other valuable property. He was also the owner of several thousand acres of land in Missouri and Virginia, and had a life insurance of \$45,000.

re His funeral will take place on Tuesday morning and interment made at Marietta cemetery.
