PUBLISHING WAR RECORDS.

Lancastrians to Furnish Accounts of the Major George Davis, of Washington, D, C., in charge of the publication of the war records, has made up a list of those regiments and batteries from which no official reports of the battle of Chickamanga have een received. As the volumes covering this period are now being put in type, he is very anxious to secure such of these originals as may be in private hands, or such copies as were made from the originals, and which can be vouched for as correct. If those having such reports will send them to Major Davis at the war department they will be copied and returned, if it is so de-sired, and the reports will then appear in the forthcoming volumes. Nothing but originals or fully authenticated copies can be used.

Among the reports missing are those of the 77th and 79th Regiments, Pennsylvania Volunteers. In the first named regiment was a company recruited in this city, commanded by Fred. S. Pyfer, who afterwards became the colonel of the regiment. The 79th was recruited in Lancaster city and county, with the exception of one com-

Dr. S. T. Davis was adjutant of the 77th Regiment, and he was asked to-day in reference to the report of his regiment in that battle. He said that Col. Pyfer and almost the entire regiment was captured at that battle. He will write to Major Davis and arrange for the preparation of a report of the part the 77th took in that battle.

Alderman Barr, who was the private ecretary of Col. H. A. Hambright, of the 79th Regiment, said he did not understand why a report of the 70th's part in that battle is not on file. It was Col. Hambright's practice to make full reports to the department of all the engagements in which his regiment took part. The alderman is willing to assist Col. Hambright in preparing a report if the one filed has been lost. The officers of the 79th now living in the city will see that the regiment's history is properly prepared, for in that battle the 79th lost heavily in killed, wounded and missing.

A MIXED FIGHT.

In Which One Man Has His Head Cut and Arm Broken. The latter got several ugly punches on the nose, and he yelled murder at the top of his voice. Scheurenbrand returned to assist Maher, but Carr, in the meantime, had managed to get away.
