Death of an Old Colored Man.

Isaac Tillison, an aged colored man, died at the county almshouse yesterday afternoon. He had not been in good health for some time and recently had a stroke of paralysis. Deceased comes from Hilltown, a colored settlement in Colerain township, two miles south of Quarryville, where he lived nearly all of his life. He was an inmate of the hospital for some time. She then rang the dinner bell and summoned her husband and workmen from the harvest field to the scene. The children all died on Thursday.

The charge is made by Republicans who were displeased by Houston's appointment. The charge will be brought to the attention of the Senate next winter, and Republican senators will be asked not to confirm Houston's appointment.

One night last summer two rival political meetings were held in the streets of Birmingham. Prominent Republicans were addressing a crowd of their followers when the Democrats got up a meeting on the opposite corner. The Republican speakers were pelted with rotten eggs, which came from several directions, and the meetings broke up in a row, during which several shots were fired, but no one was hurt. R. L. Houston, now postmaster, is a young man, and is known as "one of the boys." He was in one of the crowds on the night mentioned, and since his appointment as postmaster a number of Republicans have charged that he is a Democrat, and was one of the men who threw rotten eggs. The charge is on file at Washington, and will be used against Houston in the Senate to prevent his confirmation if possible.

this leaf made into chewing tobacco and these are also on exhibition. The leaf tobacco was examined by many experts and pronounced to be be much finer in quality than the finest Lancaster county tobacco. Death of an Aged Man.
