ACTED THE MADMAN.

FRANK DAILY GETS DRUNK AND ATTEMPTS TO INJURE SEVERAL PERSONS.

Offeer Eicholtz Arrives Upon the Scen and Compels the Young Man to Drop & Butcher Knife.

Frank Daily lives with his mother on West Mifflin street. He is a cripple with but one hand, having lost it and a part of his arm in a cork factory when a boy. He is now a young man and when sober he is quiet and inclined to be somewhat respect-able. When under the influence of liquer When under the influence of liquor, and he is that way very often, he acts like a madman and scems to care for nothing. He will listen to no one, but always cems bent upon doing some one an injury or damaging property. He has often been sent to jail for different terms by the mayor and magistrates for his bad behavior, and the prediction has frequently been made by persons who know the young ruffian, that he will kill some one yet. Yesterday Frank got drunk and went to his home. In the street he made a fearful noise and threatened to kill or whip anybody in that neighborhood. Indeed he seemed anxious to have an opportunity to " do " the town. When Lucretia Parks, a colored neighbor woman. passed, he struck her and wanted to heat her. She got into her ho ne and he tried to force the door open. Finally, when he had left, she went to the office of Alderman Spurrier and made complaint against him, charging him with assault and battery and drunken and disor-derly conduct. The warrant was given to Constable Andy Eicholtz, who found Daily at his own home. When the officer went into the house Daily was up stairs. He had a long ugly butcher knife, with a tremendous blade, in his hand, and with this he threatened to cut the heart of his poor old mother, who is a little woman. She stood shivering in a corner while her son flourished the knife in front of her, cursing and swearing and making all kinds of threats. When Eicholtz entered Daily turned upon him and threatened to cut him. The officer was not taking any killing in his just then, and without much ado he pulled his revolver and pointed it at the head of the young tough, telling him that he would bore him full of holes if he did not drop the knife. This had the desired effect, and Daily showed himself to be a weakener when confronted by a man meaning business. He dropped the knife, and the officer, after having a tussle with him, threw him so hard across a table that his wind was pretty well knocked out. Officer Olt, who had arrived in the meantime, then assisted Eicholtz to the station house with Daily. Alderman Spurrier committed him for a hearing on Friday evening.
