

DR. BRADLEY IN TROUBLE.

He is charged with the embezzlement of \$5,000 or \$10,000. Dr. William H. Bradley, once reading clerk of the House of Representatives at Harrisburg, the founder and for many years proprietor of the Weekly Press, is charged with the embezzlement of funds from the Press company, and has been placed under \$4,000 bail to appear before Magistrate Leamon for a hearing next Monday.

The captain says he accidentally found out that the doctor had not been at a certain point reported to have been visited in his expense account. He telegraphed to a number of editors up the state whom his agent was supposed to have visited with the object of promoting the Press business. The result in a number of cases was the reply that they had never seen Dr. Bradley.

By setting further watch upon his agent Captain Cook discovered that while he was in Beaver and Altoona and Reading in his bills he was in Philadelphia all the while in person.

In addition to the method, Captain Cook says he discovered that money advanced to Dr. Bradley for purchase of postage stamps was pocketed and used for private purposes.

Mr. Cook confronted the agent with the charge of embezzlement and fraudulent accounts. For a time the charge was denied, but finally the doctor broke down. He then wrote a letter to Mr. Cook, stating that he had done the Press a great wrong; that he had deliberately used money for private pleasures; that there were no extenuating circumstances of his guilt, and that he would make every possible effort at restitution.
