Of its 3,000 population, probably 2,000 or more are negros, of a low class, ignorant and mostly vicious. They are laborers, longshoremen and roustabouts; and work at 15 cents an bour whenever they can find employment shoveling coal, leading vessels and unloading cars. A half acore of us sat on a rail fence in the centre of the city fast night and interviewed some of there as they passed. One who told us his local Baptist preacher, was particularly entertaining and a characteristic Southern negro. He discussed abstruse theological, social and economic problems with selfconfidence and ready wit; and when he closed the services he lifted a liberal col-

The negroes assured us that they were all Republicans and Mahone men. Ry a popular vote the county seat of Warwick county, formerly up in the woods fifteen miles distant, was transferred to Newport News, and now the county court is holden in the hotel (Warwick house) and the county jail is an old shed near the coal wharf.

A little old negro with gray whiskers, a bad hat and a good deal of pomposity, related with some pride that he was a native of Adams county, Pennsylvania, " near where the battle was fought." He had mlisted in the Union army come down here and staved, and was the only Northern-born colored man in the three counties.

He introduced us to the peace officer of the jurisdiction who informed us he held his commission from the county court; and that as yet, Newport News has no municipal organization, but is simply under the county government. Under the guidance and protection of this officer some of the party took in "The Rockets," a quarter of the News that is made up of the most depraved and vicious negroes. A dozen dens of lufamy are the scenes of the most legraded orgies, and persons familiar with the vices of the French capital declare that no such shameless abandonment is to be seen publicly even there.

The way from point to point in this ctiy lies often through bramble and undergrowth of bushes, and choice trim lots are grown up with cedars and scrub oak.
