Over 178,000 trenchant pens have started in upon 178,000 virgin diaries to state that the glorious ocean extends as far as the decollete eye can reach; that the raging main carries upon its turbulent bosom the hopes and fears of a million anxious hearts; that the placid green waters, so soothing to the eye and restful to the tired heart, can at times rear up on their hind feet and nauscate a whole nation; that the glassy surface of the summer sea hides the cometery of the world, and the peace that reigns over the quiet ocean is, after all, the hush of the tomb.

I will not say these things, therefore, but will refer feelingly to such little incidents along the way as may be of interest to those who may feel an interest in those things which may be of interest to them. I may be wrong in this, but I trust not.

I congratulate myself that I am not sick, although kind friends have fed me \$47 worth of expensive food and done everything in their power to tantalize and tear up the gastric economy.
