The telegram was addressed to "Postmaster Robertson, Lancaster, Pa." The telegraph people could find no such a man and the message was given to Postmaster Slaymaker, who opened it. He made diligent inquiry but could find nobody who knew anything of the person drowned, To-day the investigation was renewed. It was then found that there was a mistake,as the word " Robertson" should have read Rohrerstown for which place the dispatch was intended.

The boy was a son of David Heiney, of Rohrerstown, and he was formerly in the soldiers' orphan school. From a Norfolk dispatch in the Baltimore Sun this morning it is pretty certain that the boy was one of the Alliance crew. It says : "An apprentice boy was drowned from the United States steamer Alliance last night while bathing. His body was recovered this morning."

A message from Rohrerstown states that Heiney was eighteen years old, and en-listed in the navy at Philadelphia two years ago last May. Mr. Heiney has telegraphed to the authorities at Portsmouth to bury his son there.


