a Little Boat. The schooner Martha A. Bradley has ar-rived at Gloucester, Mass., having on board Charles T. Rogers, of the boat Nickelodeon, who was picked up on August 10 in a helpless condition. Rogers is thirty-nine years old, a netive of Duxbury and a jeweller by trade, although he followed the sea when young. He sailed from Boston for Paris in his eighteen-foot Nickelo-leon on July 3. in his eighteen-foot Nickeledeon on July 3. Only two vessels were spoken during thirty-eight days. By July 25 he had be-come so blind from the sun's glare on the water that he could not see his compass, and he steered by the sun for three days. For the last fourteen days his boat drifted around at the mercy of the wind and sea, the mariner being nearly exhausted. He kept a drag anchor out and managed to have a light burning at night. 

Bitten By a Copperhead. From the New Holland Clarion,

On Wednesday morning Honry Rodman. residing near Spangler's mill, in East Earl township, while out picking blackberries. come. upon a copperhead snake that lay colled in the bushes. He did not notice the stake until he felt a sharp stinging in his srm, just above the wrist, when he realized at once that he had been bitten. He hurried to his house, close by, and quickly catching a chicken he split it open and tied it upon the wound, his arm being then already much swollen. In about fifteen minutes the flesh of the chicken was quite green from the poison of the snake. He then applied a milk poultice and came to this place to Dr. Harner for further treatment. The doctor made an application to draw out the poison, and in course of half an hour a large blister was raised which, on being opened, discharged a very green matter. He was in town again Thursday evening, and was getting along quite well, although he was still suffering some pain and his arm was somewhat swollen yet.

Not the Doctor's Fault.

It was no fault of Dr. George F. Welchans, the Pennsylvania railroad company's physician in this city, that the young man who was hurt on the railroad Thursday night did not receive prompt attention. Word was first telegraphed here for an ambulance to meet the man at the station, and nothing was said about a physician. When the man arrived he was taken directly to the hospital instead of the baggage room in the station, and Dr. Welchans as not notified for an hour afterwards, when he received a telegram from Phila-delphia instructing him to attend the man. shortly after one o'clock he visited the hospital, as directed, and looked after the sufferer. Dr. Welchans is always prompt in his duties for the company and this affair was bungled up by others.
