A LAD LOSES HIS LIFE WHILE SWIMMING NEAR THE COLUMBIA DAM.

A Large Crowd Collects at the Scene of the Drowning and Men Grapple for the Body Without Success.

COLUMBIA, Sept. 3.-George Zerger, 1 young son of George Zerger, a P. R. R. conductor, living on Walnut street above Third, was drowned this morning about 11 o'clock, near the Columbia dam. The boy had been fishing and then went in swimming at the quarries. The water is very swift and the boy, being unable to swim against the current, sank from sight. The body has not yet been recovered. A large crowd has collected about the place. Men






