WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 30.
MY DEAR COLONEL AND COMBADES.—1 beg to acknowledge, with sincere thanks, the receipt of the report of the operation of the 79th Pennsylvania Regiment at Chickamauga and Mission Ridge, which you and your comrades were so kind to prepare.

I regret extremely that the statute under which the work is carried on limits

under which the work is carried on limits us to matter of strictly contemporaneous character, and so does not permit their in-sertion at this time.

I have caused them to be filed with the records of the regiment in the war depart-ment as an jenduring record of its brilliant services, and subject to publication in a new edition or in an appendix to the current work. Again with thanks, and with every good wish, believe me
