Said Mr. Key, referring to this country: "If ever forgetful of the past and present glory, she shall cease to be the land of the free and the home of the brave," and become the purchased possession of a company of stock jobbers to be the land of the free and the home of the brave, and become the purchased possession of a great moneyed corporation and to bow down to her pensioned and privileged nobility; if the patriots who shall dare to arrange her corporations and denounce her unurpations are to be sacrificed upon her gilded altar, such a country may furnish whill 'never bow the knee in Mammon's ane. No, the patriots of such a land must hide their shame in their deepest forests, and her bards must hang their harps upon the willows. Such a people, thus corrupted and degraded—
