but Spreckies' feelings cannot be touched. He says that when his new refinery opens, which will be shortly, he will begin a war on the Sugar Trust that will eventually break the combination. The new refinery will turn out one thousand tons of sugar a day, and this increased out put will cause cutting of prices to sell goods, and compel some of the refineries to shut down. The Trust will put down the price of refined sugar so far that the opposition can make no profit, perhaps, but in that case the Trust itself will make little or no profit. Having to carry idle works, with heavy capitalization, it would seem likely to be a disadvantage in that case also.

The failure of the German Sugar Trust, which has tried to control the sugar markets of all Europe, and which was in a measure dependent upon the American Sugar Trust, will now be the means of throwing a large quantity of raw sugar overboard, and cause a break in the price of refined.
