WOMEN DELIVERED AT THE CONVENTION... HOLDING AT COLUMBIA.

Programme of the Second Day's Session. Those Who Deliver Addresses and Their Subjects—Town Notes.

COLUMBIA, Sept. 18.—The Lancaster district Sunday school convention of the A. M. E. church commenced its sessions this morning at 10 o'clock in the Mt. Zion A. M. E. church.

The exercises opened with devotional exercises, and the programme published last evening was carried out during the day.

At 7:30 o'clock this evening an address will be made by Rev. B. F. Lee, D. D., LL. D., on "The best method of imparting biblical instruction."

Song services will be held at this hour by Mrs. J. W. Beckwith, W. H. Yeomans, J. T. Hammond and S. C. Brock, assisted by female delegates and the Columbia choir.

About sixty delegates present and the exercises were of an interesting character. The programme for the second day is as follows:

10.45, "Fifty Years in the Sabbath School," paper by Geo. Darby, discussed by Revs. Norris, Wilkesham and Darke.

11:30, "The Sabbath school as a factor in revivals of religion," by Rev. J. M. Palmer; alternate, the male delegate from Allen chapel.

12 p. m., "The rise and progress of the A. M. E. Sabbath schools," Address, Rev. L. M. Patterson; alternate, the male delegate from Union Station.

2:45 p. m., "The best mode of instructing small children," by Rev. G. W. Brodie; alternate the delegate of Chambersburg.

7:30 p. m., Address, The best hymns for Sabbath schools and the best method of teaching the scholars to sing," by Rev. J. W. Beckwith, D. D. General discussion.

8:30 p. m., Closing address, Rev. H. M. Turner, D. D. Prayer, 9 p. m.

Prospective Democratic Walkover. The quadrangular fight in Warren county, N. Y., for the Republican senatorial nomination, has resulted in a victory for L. W. Emerson, of Warrenburg. The Nineteenth district includes the counties of Warren, Essex and Clinton, and the nomination this year is conceded to Warren. It is expected that Emerson will be elected without mercy, and George S. Weed, of Plattsburg, is almost certain to be the Democratic nominee. The Democrats are jubilant and anticipate a walkover.

Gold in Pennsylvania. Professor Joseph Coombs, metallurgist and mining expert of London, England, sailed from New York City for England on Wednesday. Mr. Coombs has been in this country for some months, and has been engaged in the past six weeks locating mineral properties. He has succeeded in securing a number of properties upon which paying quantities of gold, silver, copper and asbestos have been discovered, and is returning fully equipped to negotiate large sales.

The judge held that the extra was wrong, and so instructed the jury. Reese obtained a verdict for \$250.
