A Lancaster dispatch to the Philadelphia Inquirer says: Benators Matthew Stanley Quay and James Donald Cameron were in consulta-tion at Donegal to day. Matthew Stanley elipped quietly out of Philadelphia on the Nisgara express this morning, ostensibly bound for Beaver, but when the train resamed into Mount Joy he chanced to see James Donald's team at the station and concluded to try the exhilterating effect of Lancaster county air. 
