DEATH OR PRIESTHOOD.

The Severe Training of the Roman Col-lege Bescribed by Father Curran. The New York Star has the following in-

lege Bescribed by Father Curran.

The New York Star has the following interview with Rev. Dr. Thomas F. Curran, a Catholic priest just returned from Rome:

"In this country there are many colleges where Catholic students are made priests, the most notable being at Nct. e Da ne. St. Charles', St. John's and Fordham, and some Jesuit schools. These institutions have the best instructors possible. In Rome, though, is where the leaders in the priesthood are taught. It takes nine years for a student to become a priest here, and to become a Jesuit the student must have spent eleven, or even twelve years in study. When he enters the Jesuit novitiste he is given a period of two years to reflect on the career on which he is about to enter. At the end of this time, if he still wishes to persevere, he is allowed to make the first vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. He then devotes five years to study only, and several more to study and teaching. In some of the institutions here the student has a very hard time of it. Up at 6 o'clock in the morning, black coffee, a little bread and a small piece of meat for breakfast, study and a very frugal dinner, more study, a walk and very, very light supper. more study, prayers and sharply at 9 to bed. This course of treatment, when adopted for several years, kills many a promising young man. But go to Rome, and it is about twice as hard to undergo the rigid mode of life."

"What students go to the Amuric in college?"

"What students go to the American col-"What students for to the American college?"

"The brightest men in the various dioceses of the country, two from each diocese, I believe, is now the rule. They do not have to pay for their tuition or support. They are put into a black gown which they are not allowed to discard from the time they enter the college. No language is allowed to be spoken, either at recitation or in the dormitories, but Italian. The greatest men of the Catholic church teach in this college the representative students from every race in the world. The students' diet is a very hard one to subsist on, and the sleeping apartments are little rooms ten by ten, with an iron cot, an iron washstand and basin and a brick floor. Here it is, rise at 5, prayers, attend services at St. Peter's, where the pope says mass each morning for the students of this college, and back to study. It is lectures and study, little to eat, and six hours' sleep. The students of the college are permitted to converse with the pope quite often. If a student graduates from Rome, if he succeeds in living through the course at the American college, that is sufficient to place him in direct communication with his bishop in whatever diocese he belongs. His knowledge of the vatican and the other leaders of the church at Rome is invaluable."

"Is the pope failing in health?"

"When I left the American college several years ago he was in excellent spirits and health. He was able to take long walks in the vatican grounds, but on my recent visit I found him unable to go about without the support of his servants. He has done the work of twenty wonderful men in his eighty years of existence. It has been study, prayer and fasting, at d, naturally, he cannot stand it much long r He reads for hours still, though in his library, which he loves as a mother love her child. He has arrived at that age where he cannot possibly do the work he tries to do, and the result is frequent attacks of "The brightest men in the various

"There are many names mentioned in "There are many names mentioned in Europe, and even one American cardinal's name was' heard often. Cardinal Maria Parrochi, the pope's vicar general, is probably the most powerful man next to the pope in the Roman church to-day. He was born in 1853, and when Leo chose him as his vicar general he was given great power. The organization of the church is practically in his hands to-day. He is a great man, and a learned man."
