From the evidence it also appeared that the Rineharts led a gypsy life, roaming through the country. Last winter they lived near Marietta and devoted most of their time to the manufactore of counterfait dollars, haives and quarters. Two half dollars have been secured by Officer Wittlek from a party who got them from Charles Rinehart. A stocking filled with counterfeit coin and the dies were thrown down a well in Marietta.

Clyman was taken to York jail to complete his term. Rupert Rinehart was also committed to jail for trial. Squire Evans has notified the United States marshal at Philadelphia of the arrest of the counterfeiters.
