

FALL FROM HIS ENGINE.

JOHN JACKSON SEVERELY INJURED AT MILL CREEK ON SATURDAY.

The Accident Occurs While Stopping at the Water Station—Theodore Bowers and Andrew Smith Badly Injured.

LANCASTER, Oct. 7.—Engineer John Jackson, of the Pennsylvania railroad, fell from his engine on Saturday afternoon, and sustained a fracture to the collar-bone and other painful injuries. He had stopped his train at Mill creek water station and was doing some work about the machinery.

While stepping from the running board to the steam chest, his foot slipped and he was thrown violently on the north main track, which resulted in the fracture of his collar-bone and badly stunned him.

His condition was such that he was unable to get to his feet. Before he started Mr. Jackson had recovered from the shock and took his train to the water station. He was taken to the hospital at the Pennsylvania hospital in Philadelphia.
