Kendig & Co., and affixed their names to the card attached to the sample certifying that the tobacco in the cases designated were equal to the sample. The Conestoga rigar company purchased ten cases of the tobacco sampled by defendant, It was taken to their factory and upon examination was found to be mouldy. B. S. Kendig & Co., were hotified, and they in turn notified the inspectors. These inspectors called at plaintiff's factory and told the manager to throw out all the damaged tobacco and send a bill to them. They did throw away 1,963 pounds and sent the bill, at 10) cents per pound to the defendants, who refused to pay it, and then suit was brought before Alderman Fordney. He decided in favor of the plaintiff and from that decision the defendant appealed, and that appeal is now being tried.
