### A FROLIC ENDS IN A FIGHT.

SEBERADERS INSIDE TOO MUCH BYE JUICE AND SEVERAL ARE INJURED.

AfterVisiting a Recontly Married Friend Party Go to the Botel at Millway and Cutlery Is Very Freely Used.

Saturday night a serious stabbing affray took place at the hotel kept by a man named Scheetz, at Millway Station, on the Reading & Columbia railroad, between Ephrata and Lititz.

In the evening a party of young men called apon Simon U. Eisenberger, who was recently married, and tendered him and his bride a serenade. The happy bridegroom was anxious to do the right thing by the boys, so he gave them a considerable quantity of beer and whisky. They all drank for some time and several of them became intoxicated. After having all the liquor at Eisenberger's, they all went over to the hotel. Here they drank more, and it was not long until a regular old-fashioned barroom fight was in progress.

Several men were pretty badly battered up, and during the fracas one of the party drew a knife which he used with considerable effect. When the smoke of battle had cleared away, and the knife had much to do with the early termination of the fight, it was found that no less than three had been cut. Their names are Lemuel Kemper, Abraham Kachel and Daniel Duck. One was stabbed in the neck, another in the back and a third in the hand. Kemper's injuries were rather serious, but the others were not. Drs. Kreider, of Akron, and Wenger, of Rothsville, were sent for and dressed the wounds of the young men. Every effort to keep the affair from getting to the public, and especially into the newspapers, was made by the hotel proprietor and his friends, without a great deal of success, however. however.

OEORGE SMITH THE CUTTER.

There were about fifty men in the party when the fighting began, and a majority of them were cigarmakers. One of the men was George Smith, who bails from Bareville, but has been working at Millway. He is the one who did the cutting. Kachel also comes from Bareville, and he and Smith had an old grudge, which had been standing for some time. It was caused by Kachel whipping Smith. Kemper and Duck are intimate friends of Kachel, and they travel with him much of the time.

Soon after the fighting began Smith drew his knife and began cutting right and left, although he was pretty sure not to cut any of his friends. It is said that Smith cut Kachel, whom he seemed anxious to carve, while the former's friends were holding Kachel down. Kemper has five separate and distinct cuts upon him. One of these, in the back of the neck, the physicans say, would have proved fatal had it been over a half inch farther. The others are about the neck and back.

Kachel was stabbed five times in the back, but his wounds, although severe, are not as bad as Kemper's. Four of Duck's fingers were cut.

HURLED NINETY-SIX FEET. Man Instantly Killed By Harrisburg
