A LOT OF YOUNG THIEVES.

They Steal a Number of Valuables From

Prof. Gleason and His Men. Prof. O. R. Gleason, the popular horse trainer, who is now giving exhibitions at the Lancaster rink, wasthe victim of thieves the Lancaster rink, wasthe victim of thieves last night and he and several of his men suffered from their depredations. The boys who did the stealing belong to a gang who loaf around the rink, despite the efforts of the managers to keep them away. This morning when Prof. Gleason's men went to the rink they made the discovery. In the dressing room in the front of the house, which was formerly a side entrance to the place when it was used as a theatre, stood a trunk, which was owned by Norton Smith, Prof. Gleason's first assistant. The lock had been pried from it and the following articles stolen: A fine overcoat valued at \$40 and a Smith & Wesson revolver worth \$12, belonging to Mr. Smith and a full suit of clothes of George Evans, another employe of Prof. Gleason, who kept things in Smith's trunk. A Colt's lightning repeating rifle, belonging to Prof. Gleason, was also stolen from a case in which it was kept, in the same room. This rifle the professor had made especially for himself in New York and used it for shooting glass balls, while giving exhibitions in the summer. He valued it at \$50 and does not think that there is another gun like it in the city.
