MATHEMATICAL PRODICY. An Illiterate Negro Who Cau Solve Any Arithmetical Problem.

Arithmetical Problem. Sam Summers, the negro prodigy, was in Shelbyville, Kentucky, yestersiny, and, as usual, entertained a large crowd, who were testing itim with all kinds of mathe-matical problems. Summers is a negro, 34 years old, without the slightest education. He cannot read or write, and does not know one figure from nother. He is a common, every-day farm hand, and to look at him and watch his actions he scems to be about half wit-ts, but his quick and invariably correct answer to any example in arithmetic, no matter how difficult, is simply wonderfal, with the hundreds of tests that he hansch-mitted to, not a single time has he falled to give the correct answer in every instance.

Some examples given him on yesterda y were: How much gold can be bought for \$702 in greenbacks if gold is worth \$1.65 ? Multiply 597.312 by 134. If a grain of wheat produces seven grains, and these bo sown the second year, each yielding the same increase, how many bushels will be produced at this rate in twelve year; if 1.600 grains make a pint? If the velocity of sound is 1,142 feet per second the pulsation of the heart seventy per minute, after seeing a flash of light-ning there are twenty pulsations counted before you hear if thunder, what distance is the cloud from the earth, and what is the time after seeing the flash of lightning until you hear the thunder ? A commission merchant received seventy bags of wheat, each containing three bush-els, three pecks and three quarks; how many bushels did he receive? And so on. With Robinson's, Ray's and other higher arithmetics before them, those who have tested him as yet have been able to find any example that with a few moments' thought on his part he is not able to cor-rectly answer. rectly answer.

Medicine That Turns the Hair Dark.

Modicine That Turns the Hair Dark. From the London Times. The Prentiss, in the Therapentic Gazette of this year, has related a remarkable occur-rence following the use of jaborandi. The patient was a woman, age seconly-two, who had snow-white hair for twenty years. For the symp ome of beginning ursamia, due to orneracted kidney, twenty or thirty minims of extract of jaborandi was prescribed sev-eral times daily. The drug was taken from October, 1886, to February, 1888. During the autumn of 1887, the evebrows were becoming darker, and the hair of the head became also darker in patches. This continued until the patches of hair were quite dark, contrast-ing with the natural patches of snow-white hair. 
