A TOUNG PHYSICIAN'S DEATH. Dr. William A. Atlee Dies Washington,

D. C., of Typhold Fever. The sad news reached Lancaster last evening of the death at Garfield hospital, in Washington, D. C., of Dr. William A. Atlee, son of W. A. Atlee, the well known attorney at law, of this city, and grandson of the late John L. Atlee, the famous phy sician. The young man had been sick with typhoid fever for about three weeks past and for 10 days his mother had been at his bedside; both she and Mr. Atlee were present when he breathed his last. The first telegram which was received here stated that he was sinking. The other which came sometime later said he had died at 9-30.

The deceased was about 24 years of age and was born in this city. He received the greater part of his education at Yeates' in-stitute. He next went to Philadelphia and graduated at the University of Pennsylvania, standing near the top of his class. He was one of the physicians at Blockley hospital for a year and until he was taken very ill with pneumonia and was obliged very ill with pneumonia and was obliged to come home. In the spring of 1889 he went to Washington and opened an office, intending to make the Capital City his future home. He was a bright young man and was rapidly building up a fine practice among the best people of Washington. His prospects were of the very best and he had a brilliant future in prospect. Mr. and Mrs. Atlee, who have the sympathy of the entire community in their terrible affliction, will come from Washington this evening, bringing the body with them.
