THE ROADBED DAMAGED. Telegraph Poles Fall From a Car and Cause Havoc at Collins.

There was a somewhat peculiar accident on the Pennsylvania railroad at Collins' station this morning. A freight train, drawn by engine 1263, was passing east and among the cars attached to it were three cars which were loaded with long telegraph poles. Just when the train reached the tower one of the standards in the side on the first part of one of the car the side on the first part of one of the cars broke. The standard was used to keep the poles in the car and as soon as it broke the front ends of the poles fell out and they were turned and twisted about in every direction.
