### TOLE FROM HIS EMPLOYER

MAN READY PARES A HORSE AND TWO MCLES PROX THOMAS STACES.

Dispuses of the Animals and Rotuga to the Farm of Stacks, Where He In Arrested on Saturday.

John Ready was lodged in the Lancaster county prison on Saturday night on charges of horse stealing and larceny. He was an employe of Thos. Stacks, a farmer, living in Concy township. Some days are Ready

was given a horse by Mr. Stacks to bring a buggy to the farm. He was also given the charge of two mules to take to a man who wanted to purchase them from Mr. Stacks.

Ready betrayed the trust reposed in him and appropriated the horse and mules to his own use. He hurriedly went to Harriedurg and there he traded the mules on a horse. This horse he sold for \$160, and received in payment a note which he had discounted. The horse he stole from Mr. Stacks he took to the neighborhood of Palmyra, Lebanon county, where he disposed of it for cash.

Ready had a good time for a few days, but his money was soon gone and he then but his money was soon gone and he then returned to the Stacks farm. His wife was also employed there, and it was to see her and induce her to go away with him that he risked returning to the scene of his

He was seen loltering about the farm and Constable Burkholder was notified. He waited until he had information of the exact whereabouts of Ready. When he learned that the thief was secreted under the hay in the barn he went after him and arrested him. Ready was greatly surprised that his biding place had been discovered. He said he had made arrangements to go a way from the neighborhood on Saturday night. When he was searched only 94 cents were in his pockets. The supposition is that he has secreted some of the money received for the horse and mules and in tended using it to travel to the West. Ready was brought to Lancaster on Satur

day evening's train, and taken before Ai-derman Halbach and committed for a hearing. It is probable that he had accompilces in disposing of the stolen property.

P. H. Seltzer and C. H. Eby are the men
in Harrisburg to whom he traded the mules for a horse. These parties then sold

the mules to a street car company and Mr. Stacks will issue a writ of replevin for them. Complaints have been made at Barrisburg against Seltzer and Eby for larceny and receiving stolen goods. The have been returned to court and will be tried on Wednesday.

Ready is a man about 30 years old, and

went to Mr. Stacks to work several months ago. His home is at Palmyra, Lebanon county, and he has well-to-do relatives there. Mr. Stacks will take steps to recover his horse sold by Ready in Lebanon

Ready was given a hearing at noon to-day. He admitted his guilt at the alder-man's office and in default of \$1,000 ball was committed for trial at the quarter sesslous court, beginning next Monday.

The charges against Ready are horse stealing and larceny, and the pecucases. For stealing the mare of Mr. Stacks, the offense is horse stealing; but for steal-ing mules the offense is ordinary larceny. In this case the mules stolen were valued a three times as much as the mare, yet the punishment for horse stealing is much more severe than for larceny.

HE OFFERS \$20,000,000 HEIRESSES.

A swindler Who Works Upon the Guilibility of Poor Noblemen.

Poverty-stricken noblemen of Europe have been very cleverly taken in by a swindler who has made San Francisco the scat of his operations. The victims as far as known are over 200 in number. They have been trapped by the following advertisement which appeared in several European newspapers, notably those of Germany:

"Gentlemen of position, noblemen, cava-

pean newspapers, notably those of Germany:

"Gentlemen of position, noblemen, cavaliers, and office of high standing (military o. 'ivil) who wish to marry very rich, educated American ladies, may put themselves in communication with the undersigned. Ladies with property to \$20,000,-000 are on our list. The greatest discretion guaranteed. Photographs and detailed reports will be furnished. Address the international Bureau for Private Transactions, San Francisco, California, America."

The way hungry princes, dukea, barons and counts fell upon this alluring bait must have staggered the ingenious conceiver of the enterprise. By the very first return post they began sending in orders and giving specifications as to the kind of American heiresses they wanted. The letters containing orders increased with each mail, till now they are fairly pouring in. On Saturday forty ordinary letters arrived, besides a half dozen registered containing the advance fees of those cager and anxious to be first on the books in order to have their pick of the \$20,000,000 heiresses.

Newspaper clippings describing local heiresses, with a short pen sketch minutely portraying their qualifications, together with their well known photographs, were sent to the noble subscribers to the international bureau. The man who called at the postoffice gave his name as Ludwig von Romayer, and spoke with a German accent. The second time he called for his mail letters written from the larger cities of Northern and Central Europe were handed to him. He was not permitted to take a lot of registered letters containing money till he was properly identified by some reputable business man.

When questioned the fellow gave a fictitious address and was allowed to go, although he will be brought up with a round turn if he attempts to collect the numerous registered letters at the office for him. There seem to have been some deluded noblemen in Vienna, as Otto Masss, vice consul general of the United States there, has sent a clipping from the Vienna News Freis Presse of Von Romayer's enticing advertisement. On the margin he has written:

#### 20,000 MINERS IDLE.

Disastrons Effect of the Open Wluter on

Disastrons Effect of the Open Winter on the Anthracite Coal Trade.

It is a strange fact that 20,000 hard coal miners in the authracite basin, nearly half of whom are now idle, should be studying climatic changes and wondering whether cold weather has forever disappeared for this latitude, instead of being at work mining coal. Warmweather continues, the miners keep idle, and the reports come up from tidewater that there is enough coal there to last a year if there is no more cold weather. A feeling of gloom pervades the up from tidewater that there is enough coal there to last a year if there is no more cold weather. A feeling of gloom pervades the entire region. It is known that the coal companies have been rushing coal to market at a surprising rate, and that stocks on hand amount to several hundred thousand tons, enough and to spare should a sudden and lengthy siege of cold weather, dandelions are blooming in the meadows, angle worms are as near the surface as ever, grain is growing, grass is greening, and there is only an ordinary spring consumption of coal. A long period of idleness, therefore, appears to be ahead for the anthracite coal miners.

A well authenticated report prevails at the coal mines that Mr. Corbin has been rushing coal to market for a special purpose, and that he intends cutting prices right and left. By underbidding the Lehigh Valley Railroad company he succeeded in getting the contract to furnish the Manhattan Elevated supply of 250,900 tons for the coming year, and it is said that other large contracts will be secured in a similar manner, thus forcing a market, and keeping the few collieries running by selling coal at a hare margin, in order to keep

keeping the few collieries running by sell-ing coal at a bare margin, in order to keep the rolling stock of the Reading Railroad

company moving.

The iron trade continues very active, and there is considerable sale, therefore, for the larger sizes of anthracite coal, but this has no effect on the smaller or domestic sizes. narger sizes of anthracite coal, but this has no effect on the smaller or domestic sizes. All the coal companies have shut off considerable in their coal shipments, and for the first five days this year the falling off was about 110,000 tons, as compared with the shipments of 1889 for the same period of days. In the meantime wholesale prices are being cut at tidewater, and it is proba-ble that the next allottment of miners' wages will be far below the regular basis.
