A Steam Shovel Blown to Pleces.

NO MORE WAR. Pan-Americans Have a Plan For Sot-tling Quarrels.

The following resolution was signed and presented in the Pan-American conference on Wednesday by the delegates of the Argentine Republic and Brazil. This resolution introduced at the present time shows the friendly feeling and the desire which the nations have for consolidating and thus bettering the condition of all, especially when the Argentine Republic and Brazil are at present involved in a dispute as to the limits of their respective territories. The resolution reads as follows:

Considering that the international policy of the American conference should be characterized by principles and declarations of mutual security and respect among all the states of the continent; that this feeling of security must be inspired from the very moment in which the representatives of the three Americas meet for the first time so as to show that their acts and resolutions respond to sentiments of mutual confidence and frank cardiality, the

resolutions respond to sentiments of mutual confidence and frank cordiality, the congress being also desirous to give assent to the principles which public law has established in favor of the weak states and in honor of the powerful, and which are confirmed by the ethics of nature and proclaimed by humanity, it is hereby declared:

ciamed by intractional arbitration is a principle of American public law, to which the nations in this conference bind themselves for decisions not only on their questions on territorial limits, but also on all those in which arbitration may be com-

all those in which arbitration may be compatible with sovereignty.

Second—The armed occupation of the disputed territories, without having first tried arbitration, shall be considered contrary to the present declarations and to the engagements accepted thereby, but resistance opposed to said acts of occupation shall not have the same character.

Third—The arbitration may take place in an impersonal form whenever the states agree to the election of only one arbitrator. But if it takes place in a collective form there shall be appointed an equal number of judges by each party, with powers to elect an umpire in case of disagreement, said election to be made at the first meeting of the tribunal.

Fourth—The election of arbitrators shall not be subject to any limitations or exclusions. The election of arbitrators may be sions. The election of arbitrators may be either in favor of the governments represented in this conference or in favor of any other governments desiring the confidence of the parties, and also in favor of scientific corporations or of high functionaries of either of the interested States themselves

either of the interested States themselves or of other neutral States.

Fifth—The recent declarations are applicable not only to differences which may in future arise in the relations of the States, but also to those which in a different form are now in actual discussion between the governments; but the rules to be made shall have no bearing upon arbitration already constituted.

Sixth—In cases of war the triumph of arms shall not convey any rights to the territory of the vangulshed.

Seventh—The treaties of peace which put an end to the hostilities may fix the pecuniary indemnification which the beligerent states may owe to each other, but if

The City of Easton is on the verge of heavy suits for damages. On Tuesday, R. C. Stewart, master, rendered his report in the T rail controversy between the city and the Easton, South Easton & West End Stree Car line, in which he finds for the company. The City of Easton passed an ordinance declaring that in the fature when street car companies occupied new streets or repaired their track in occupied streets the plans must be approved by the Highway Department. The Highway Department took up the T rails. The company got out an injunction and relaid the rails. The Court disselved the injunction. In the meantime the master was appointed. He finds the following facts: That the Trail as laid, flush with the street, on an iron chair, is fitted for general use for street railways; that its use does not enforce a greater burden on municipalities than does the flat rail, that it does not occasion a nuisance. He also finds that the city committed a trespass on the company's property in tearing up the rails, and that whether the ordinance was valid or not the street car company was not bound by its provisions. He recommends that a perpetual injunction be granted restraining the city from interfering with the street car company, and that the representatives of the city pay the costs. These three fees amount to over \$1,500. President Sage, of the street car company, says he will press all suits for damages and trespass, fixing his claim at \$20,000, and that personal suits for assault on officers and employes of the road will also be pushed.

Bitten By a Mad Horse.

In the early part of last fall William Nippes, who owns a large farm in Lower Merion township, Montgomery county, had one of his horses bitten by a mad dog. Since then the animal has done considerable work, and has not shown any effects of the bite. The fact that the horse had been bitten was forgotten entirely, and no attention was paid to the animal. He was put in the stable with a number of cows, and he behaved just as gentle as an animal could until within a few days. Last Sanday hydrophobia developed in the horse, and, plunging madly about the stable, he bit a number of the cows. On Monday the animal was killed, and now Mr. Nippes is considering whether or not he shall kill the cows. He has a milk route, and many of his customers refuse to buy milk from Bitten By a Mad Horse. of his customers refuse to buy milk from him, thinking that it may be impregnated with the virus of the mad horse.

A Crooked Building Association. They succeeded in selling some 167 shares at 31 each, and immediately organized a local board for the association to carry on their fraudulent transactions. Associations were formed throughout the Cumberland Valley. Some of the leading business men were connected with them. Everything went along smoothly until the Philadelphia Fress on Wednesday exposed the crockedness of the organizer. The city agents declare they are innocent of any fraud and say they were hired on salary to sell the stock and have turned over the proceeds to a man in Philadelphia. The shareholders here have decided to take no further action in the matter until they have ascertained the American Association's standing. American Association's standing.
