The duke, however, still keeps his fortune invested in British consols.

A vigilance committee has been formed in Lisbon for the purpose of denouncing receivers of English goods. French financiers have declined to nego

French financiers have declined to negotiate a loan for Portugal.

The Lisbon Seculo published on Friday
a manifesto from the directory of Portuguese Republicans. It is calm in tone and
discountenances revolution at present but
bitterly denounces England and urges a
federation of the Latin nations. It declares
that the movement for a federation of Latin
republies is steadily making great progress
and that the force of that movement is seen

PASSENGER TRAINS COLLIDE.

Five Persons Killed and Burned in Wreck Near Cincinnati. Wreck Near Cincinnati.

At a quarter past seven on Friday evening the Glendale accommodation train, on the Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton railroad, had just passed Winton Place, a suburb of Cincinnati, when the Chicago vestibule train, running at high speed, plunged into the rear car which happened to be the baggage car. The wreck at once took fire from the crushed stove in the baggage car. Ahead were coaches crowded with nearly 400 people. The force of the collision threw every one out of their seats, and a number were wedged in by broken seats and crushed timbers. The flames fairly jumped from car to car. At once the fire department at Cincinnati was summoned. The fireman and engineer of the fast line and the baggage master and his assistant, dangerously wounded and scalded, were with the utmost difficulty removed from the fiery wreck. By the time two fire companies arrived the two coaches

were almost in ashes.

The dead are: John Wilson, superintendent of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company, in Cincinnati; F. W. Witherbee, conductor of No. 77, residence Toledo; an unknown woman; James Staley, baggage master of train No. 77, of Dayton, O.; Wm. Klanitz, a boy passenger of Carthage, O. They were burned to death.

CINCINNATI, Jan. 18.—The list of killed in the railroad accident at Spring Grove Cemetery, as sent from here last night, was correct with a single exception. What was then thought to be the unidentified body of a woman has since found to be the body Chas. Kellar, of Winton Place. Mr Kellar and Mr. Wilson were the only passengers who boarded the ill-fated train at Winton Place. Mr. Kellar was going to Cumminsville, barely a five minutes' ride to settle some business matter.

Mr. Wilson was a 32d degree Mason and was coming to Cincinnati to attend the meeting of his lodge. Both were in the rear car and were probably killed by the

Speer had been a sufferer from a strange nervous malady, which baffled the skill of all local physicians. Last week this resulted in a partial strategy of the state ke of paralysis, which affected

tial stroke of paralysis, which affected his entire left side. Subsequent investigation shows that Mr. Speer's affliction was the result of lead poisoning, due to his drinking of water which stood in lead pipes.

Mr. Speer was the recognized leader of the Democratic party in Huntingdon county, and the foremost member of the Huntingdon bar. His death is deeply deplored among all classes in that section. Mr. Speer's interment will take place on Monday afternoon.

Mr. Speer was born in Cassville, Huntingdon county, on September 8th, 1838. He

He received the nomination from the Dem-ocrats of the Seventeenth Congressional district in 1870, was duly elected, and having acquitted himself to the complete satisfaction of his constituents was re-elected to faction of his constituents was re-elected to the following Congress. On both occasions of his election it was from a Republican district, and he ran from 1,000 to 1,500 votes ahead of his ticket.
