RIMINAL COURT OPENS. MANY RAILROADERS ILL. PURCE PAYFERSON EXSTRUCTS GRAND JURGES AND A CITY CONSTABLE.

To Before to Causes Why Murderers are Not Hanged-Parts of Three City Streets Said to be Nuisances.

The January term of the quarter sessions court was opened at 10 o'clock this morning with Judge Patterson presiding. There are on the printed list for trial 142 cases and there have been a number returned since the list was printed. Among the important cases are John Ready, horse stealing; John Pehr, "Barnum's Kid," for false pretense; Richard King, burglary; Jacob Faust and George Peiffer, horse stealing.

In conclusion he congratulated the jury that there were no capital cases to enage the attention of the court. All such in two there were convictions of murder in the first degree, but no executions. The newspapers blame the court for the delay of carrying the sentence of the law into execution, but after sentence is passed courts have nothing further to do. The responsibility for the enforcement of the law rests with the pardon board and governor. The delay in the carrying into effect of he law in capital cases is caused by attorneys. They go before the pardon board with a lot of affidavits of what they will prove, and in that way secure a postpone ment of the sentence of the law.

THE CONSTABLES' RETURNS. The constables were called before the court to make a return of violations of law since the last term of the court. Judge Patter son asked Constable Herr, of the Eighth ward, for his return and it was handed to him. The court read it and asked Mr. Herr if he did not know of a vacant house in the Eighth ward occupied nightly by a gang of boys who disturbed the neighood. Mr. Herr said he did, but that the nuisance had been abated.

The court asked Mr. Herr who owned the building, and he said that John Gill was the owner. The court instructed Mr. Herr to see that Mr. Gill did not again rent his house to tenants who would disturb the neighborhood. The constables of the several districts

made their usual quarterly returns. There were a few returns made for violation of the law and the city of Lancaster was returned for maintaining nuisances in not having the following streets in passable dition: North Mary, between Walnut and James; North Prince, between Clay and Liberty : East Chestnut, between North Queen and Christian.

A not pros was entered in the case against Benjamin Swinehart charged with giving liquor to a minor. The counsel interested in the case stated that the prosecutor was of weak mind and the complaint should not have been brought. A MONUMENT FOR HIGHER.

School Children and Teachers to Erect a Memorial at Harrisburg.

A circular addressed to the teachers and scholars of the public schools of Pennsylvania issued by M. G. Brunbaugh and M. J. Brecht as preident and secretary of committee, eulogizes the late Dr. E. E. Hig-bee and proposes that the children of the public schools aid in erecting a monument o Dr. Higbee upon the capitol grounds a Harrisburg. If enough money for this purpose can not be raised, or if the consent of the Legislature can not be seured, a monument is to be erected over his remains, and a large crayon portrait of him placed in each of the normal schools. Friday, January 31, 1890, is named Higsee Memorial Day, and through this circular issued to every school in the state it is requested that it be observed by devoting short time to exercise appropriate the character of Dr. Higbee and to receiving contributions to the monument fund. "It is hoped that every scholar will join in this free gift offering and that the sum contributed shall average at least one cent for every pupil and ten cents for every teacher. Principals and superintendents are required to remit contributions before the first of June next.

The Fulton bank of Lancaster is author ized to act as trustee of the fund, and will duly acknowledge all moneys received. The State Teachers' association will be saked to appoint an executive committee of five active school men, who will be empowered to carry into effect all necessray arrangements for the memorial.
