THE SOMOAN TREATY. Blaine Says the Commission Was St

Blaine Says the Commission Was Successful.

The Senate on Wednesday, in secret session, resolved to make public the Samoan treaty negotiated in Berlin last spring, and the protocols showing the result of each day's meeting of the commissioners. The president says: "I am pleased to find in this general act an honorable, just and equal settlement of the questions which have arisen.

Secretary Blaine's letter to the president is very lengthy. He begins by reciting

Secretary Blaine's letter to the president is very lengthy. He begins by reciting the fact that in a confidential communication to the Senate on February 27 last, President Cleveland gave reasons why the appointment of the treaty commissioners should be left to the incoming administration. The secretary says the commissioners were told that the United States desired a speedy and amicable settlement; that it maintained its equality of right in the disposition of the questions, but was influenced as much by an anxious desire to secure to the people of Somea the conditions of a healthy, prosperous and civilized life, and was bound to protect the interests of its own citizens. The subjects at to which the commissioners were instructed fell under five heads:

First, they were directed to ask the restoration of the status quo in order to remove the disturbance caused by the forcible intervention of Germany and the deportation of Malletos. This was not to be an ultimatum.

Second, the organization of a stable governmental system for the islands, whereby native independence and autonomy should be preserved free from the control or preponderating influence of any foreign government. rnment.
Third, the adjustment of land claims.
Fourth, the prohibition of the sale of frearms and alcoholic liquors.

Fifth, the question of a municipal administration of Apia as a foreign settlement.

Reckless "Buyer" Turns Upat Gap, But Disappears Suddenly. The story of the operation of the man who

recklessly purchased tobacco in the neighborhood of Lampeter, last week, and then ran away, was not all told in yesterday's INTELLIGENCER. Reports show that he bargained to take the crops of a great many farmers at the most exorbitant prices. This young man was tall and slim, with light hair and moustache and had one eye which looked as though it was glass. Another young man, who may have been a partner of Proctor, operated about Gap in a similar manner during the latter part of last week. He was a small man with a dark moustache, and said his name was Hirsh, and that he came from New York. He stopped at Rutter's hotel, and

for two days drove around among the farmers. He purchased a great many crops of tobacco, or at least offered to take them, at as high as 20 and 21 cents per pound through. Like the Lampeter man he told the farmers to come to Gap and he would pay them something in advance for his tobacco. The arrangement was that they were to meet him on Saturday, but by the time they arrived he had flown To one farmer he gave a check for \$5, which was no good.

On Saturday the tobacco man spent part of the day about the village, and finally he started off down the railroad track, saving that he was going for his team. He never came back and has not been seen since. He left behind him an unpaid hotel bill, and he also owed Penn Linville for two days horse hire at \$5 per day. He had purchased a horse from a man named Lapp, at the Gap, who smelled a rat, however, and did not deliver him.

While in the village Hirsh told the wild-est tales about the tobacco business and these made the people shy of him. He said that he had started in at Delta, York county, and had purchased a great deal of tobacco through to Gap. He had secured every crop between Columbia and Port Deposit. He offered Nat Bushong \$20 if he would drive with him about the country two days buying tobacco, but the kind offer was refused. During his stay Mr. Hirsh wore no vest, but he had on a very fancy shirt, and he offered to send one to each of a number of men about the Gap-when he returned to New York.

Chief Smeltz received a postal to-day to be on the lookout for William Miller, who also goes under the names of Wm. Myers and W. H. Boyer. Under the latter name he forged a check yesterday for \$150 on the Lebanon National bank. He is described as being six feet in height, slim build and beard, but long light moustache.
