Rev. Dr. Hark said that Dr. Higbee was many sided a man that to then dwell spon more than one or two phases of his character was impossible. He would call attention to him as our exponent of the only true end of education—a broad human culture. Culture affects the whole man, special instruction only some part of him. The reproach is still heard him. The reproach is still heard that our schools turn out good spellers, grammarians and arithmeticians, but not enough who can think correctly on subjects outside of their text books, have refined tastes and lofty aspirations. To all such he held up Dr. Higbee as the embodiment of what public education means to attain. Such a manhood as his symmetrically rounded life is not attained by any mere technical instruction. It is that type of culture for which the public schools are striving and its characteristics are: first, that it is something practically useful. There are some benighted people who believe that any education other than teaching how to measure drygoods and weigh groceries and count money is unpractical; that to know the reason of things, and to see their beauty, is a superfluous accompsee their beauty, is a superfluous accomp-lishment rather in the way of one who wants to make a living. Was it the case with Dr. Higbee? Did his knowledge of botany and half a dozen other branches of natural science, make him less profound as a theologian, less eloquent as a preacher, or less useful as a pastor? On the contrary we know it was just this that gave him much of his grace and power in the pulpit, and if he had so willed might have made and if he had so willed might have made bim one of the most popular and effective ministers in the state. The same was the case with his art training and every branch of culture. It was because he knew so much more than a superintendent must know that he excelled in his office. Secondly, true culture is reverent andreligious. The infidel is one-sided and writtons, balance between faculties of mind and heart.
