Expecting Big Sums of Money.

John Steinmetz, a paper-hanger in Minmapolis, expects shortly to secure a large fortune. In the closing years of the Eighteenth century, Mr. Steinmetz's greatgrandfather was a ship owner in Philadelphia. At that time France and England were at war, and though the United State refused to be drawn into the quarrel, our shipping was subjected to apoliation by French privateers. Steinmetz's ancestor's ships were among those that suffered. Now the ship owner's descendants, some fifteen in number, are to be satisfied for the wrongs France did so many years ago, and Mr. Steinmetz's share of the claim will, it is said, amount to over \$227,000.

The claims are those known as French spoliation claims. Steinmetz recently received a letter from his mother, who lives in Philadelphia, stating that the claim would be paid by the government within sixty days. The hitch in collecting the claim heretofore has been the matter of interest. The money has been in the government hands so long that the interest would more than equal the principal. This the government has refused to pay. It is willing to pay the principal to the rightful heirs but not the interest. It is understood that the family of which Steinmetz is a member has practically agreed to this, in order to save further delay.

One of the principal heirs of the vast Moffi t estate in England has been discovered in the person of James Moffitt, a farm hand living near Springfield, O. The state was left by Moffitt's great-grandfather and is principally in money, amounting to £10,000,000, which has been accumulating at 3 per cent, compound interest in London banks. The fortune originally

It was advertised in the papers throughout the United States that an immense estate had been left by Moffitt in England, and some heirs were supposed to

England, and some heirs were supposed to live in this country.

The Moffitts, who have now been traced down as legal heirs, failed to see the advertisement and ten years passed, when similar advertisements were published. Finally a postal card was seen in Tennessee, III., by a cousin of James Moffit, directed to the postmaster at that place. The card contained the information that an attorney was hunting for Moffit heirs. James Moffit took the cue from this and immediately set to work on evidence to establish his claim. The original heirs were brothers and sisters of Adam Moffit, but only two of them survive, William Moffitt and Anna Baldwin, of Union county Ohio.
