Died of Her Wound.

Mrs. Mary Lebo, who was shot recently by her husband, in Reading, Pa., died on Sunday. The murderer is still at large.

Some words passed between them when Lebo pulled out a revolver and fired at her. The bullet entered her head near the temple. The ball was subsequently extracted, but the woman has been unconscious ever since, and gradually grew weaker until death ensued on Sunday. When her father heard of the shooting he dropped dead instantly of heart disease. Lebo fled the city immediately after the shooting and has not yet been apprehended. On the night of the tragedy he went to Robesonia, Berks county, and was seen in that place soveral times since. Officers from Reading have been searching that vicinity for the past two days. He is about 30 years of age, while his wife is 23. The coupled had only only been married a little over a year, and the cause of the murder was jealousy.
