RELISON MOUNTS HANGED.

calcion Mounts Hanged.

Selecting the Penalty for His Part in the McCoy Murders - Riding to Death on His Coffin.

Ellison Mounts was banged at Pikeville, Ky., on Tuesday for participating in the murder of Miss Alasir McCoy and her brother. The condemned man was cool to the last, and as the black cap was pulled over his face he declared that the Hatfield mag forced him to engage in the murder. The drop fell at 12:37 o'clock.

The scaffold was crected in the suburbs of the town in valley overlooked by the graveyard. A small board fence was built around the instrument of death, more to avoid the law prohibiting public hanging than to prevent the multitude from witnessing the proceedings.

In view of the thronts made by Mounts' friends to rescue him, the greatest care was observed to prevent such an arrangement. All strangers to the authorities were excluded from the enclosure in which the scaffold was situated. Mounts requested to be permitted to see the scaffold on Wednesday. The favor was refused, as it was thought to be a scheme to effect his scape. The jail was closely guarded and the town was surrounded by armed pickets. The place much resembled the preparations prior to the approach of an army. Mounts did not close his eyes during his last night on earth. His attorneys were hopeful for a reprieve, but not so with the condemned. His friends assorted his in-anity to the last moment, and are now loudly declaring that a crazy man has been hung.

ile the death warrant was being read

While the death warrant was being read in the jail the prisoner appeared ulterly indifferent, quietly smoking a cigar. When the hour arrived for the trip to the scaffold to be made the officers began to arm themselves. Two dozen men composed the guards. Each was armed with a revolver and a Winchester. It was a determined looking posse.

The prisoner took his seat on a coffin in a wagon. The guards surrounded the valide and the death march commenced. Only a few minutes elapsed after reaching the scaffold before the execution occurred. Death was instantaneous. The body was given to friends and will be interred in the mountains of West Virginis.

After the execution the officers discovered a plot which, if successful, would have resulted in the escape of the prisoner and the probable death of a number of the guards of the jail. Through the confusion of the jail cook the discovery was made. The Hatfield gaug, with whom Mounts was connected at the time, planned the affair. The Hatfields had paid the cook 200 to place a drug in the food of the jail gaards.

The cook was told that the drug which was given her was merely to make the guards.

The cook was told that the drug which was given her was merely to make the guards go to sleep. She became suspicious and concluded to try the effects of the preparation on the jail cat. The result was the metant death of the animal in horrible agony. She then became alarmed and remained to put the poleon into the food. She did not communicate her intentions, however, to the cullaws, and they were gathered near the jail to await the signal which would indicate that all the guards were next within.

Had this wholesale attempt at murder been successful, not only the prisoners in the jail would have been killed, but also the sheriff's jfamily and the posse. The drug was found to be strychnine. The cook was immediately arrested. All the outlaw gang have fled to the mountains of West Virginia, where it is sure death to officers who follow them. All these lawless persons who are responsible for this outrageous affair are from West Virginia.

Should they be brought back there during the present intense excitement, every one of them would be instantly mobbed, as the people are crazy with indignation.

This is the first legal hanging that ever occurred in that vicinity for years. The belief that Mounts was instance is becoming more prevalent in the vicinity. If he was rational at the time of arrest it is probable that the continued confinement and suspense detbroned his reason. He has acted remarkibly strange in his cell for months. At some times he would refuse to talk, would not recognize his most intimate friends, and at other times he would appear to be acquainted with every one who passed.
