NELLIE BLY PLRASES AN AUDIENCE the Tells of Her Trip Around the World

In seventy-two Days.

In spite of bad weather Nellie Bly, the globe-trotter, had a fairly well filled house on Thursday night when she lectured in Fation hall, under the auspices of the Young Men's Democratic society. She was introduced by W. U. Hencel, e.g., as a young lady who was the first, not only of her sex, but of her race to travelaround theworklin seventy-two days. Miss Bly is surprisingly school-girlish in appearance and manner, and has a fresh young voice that is very pleasant to listen to. In the beginning of her talk, for it was not a lecture, she shifted uneasily from one foot to another, after the fashion of nervous school children when "speaking a piece," but she was soon more at ease and by her frank and bright way of telling of her trials and humors of travel she easily won the sympathies of the sudience, Her imaguage as a rale was good convermitonal lenglish, and the criticisms of it published in the metropolitan papers seem ill tempered and uniques, but as Miss Bly is undoubtedly a wide awake little woman she may have already profited by the critice' observations. As for her story, it was a triffing sketch of the minor incidents of travel As for her story, it was a triffing sketch of the minor incidents of travel with occasional graphic references to the most striking scenes. She has a keen cause of humor and plenty of sudacity which served her well in traveling; and in recounting her struggles with seasickness, British dudes and monsoons she contrived to interest and amuse her audience. Miss Biy has the art of being quietly pathetic and then suddenly gay again in a way that is irresistible. Her reference to the feelings that almost overcame her as she sailed away from the crowd on the pier at New York was naturally touching and all the more effective because she did not waste many words on it. Her simple reference to her feelings of defiant pride when she saw in China the first American flag that saw in China the first American flag that also had found since leaving home brought well merited applause. The audience seemed to see the solitary little American school girl bravely pushing her way in foreign lands, and native American gallantry was touched and heartlly responded.
