When a more boy of fifteen the Scots made an incursion into the Roman provinces of Britain. Of the large number of prisoners captured Patrick was one. Later on he was sent to the north of Ireland, and there sold as a slave. For aix years he tended the cattle of his master, his day dreams filled with the desire to escape and his night dreams with plans for the accomplishment of that purpose.

The opportunity was offered and embraced. After great difficulty he found his way to Britain, and thence to the continent where he received his education. He was then about twenty-two. History grows vague at this point and authorities differ, but the story goes that after due preparations for his work had been completed he was commissioned at Rome to undertake the task he had set himself, and so returned to Ireland as a preacher of the new gospol. There his burning eloquence, his attractive fervor gained him many adherents. On the hillsides, in the green valleys, he gathered audiences of rude, uncultured folk, who bent before his vivid speech as a field of wheat to a conquering gale.
