I saw him after he was brought from his cell where he was to one opposite mine, and he was a frightful object. Three of the keepers were leading him, or rather carrying him. He was convicted in Media under the name of James McGinnis, although his right name is said to be Paul —, and it was also said that he was one of the Welsh mountain gang and under his real name had done time in Lancaster. He was thirtydone time in Lancaster. He was then taken sight days opposite me and was then taken out to the prison hospital, I suppose, where

A Press man visited New Holland, the Welsh Mountains and this city and found that John McGinnis was Paul Quigloy. He also learned of the criminal career of the man, with the Buzzards, and of his several takes from jail, all of which have fre-eightly been published in the INTELLI-ENCER. He saw the mother of the dead man who lives here, and found that she had been trying for a long time to learn the cause of her boy's death and also had tried to get the body. She had consulted Brown & Hensel, who wrote to the prison authorities in regard to the matter, and received an answer that the body had been buried and could not be secured. She had learned that he died of quick consumption, but he was never trou-bled in that way before he went away. She last saw him in 1887, when he started for

PETTICOATED POLITICIANS. Women Making Great Efforts to Control of Kansas Towns. Topeka Dispatch to New York World.

The granting of municipal suffrage to women has proved a grand success in Kansas. It is going to play a more important part in the approaching spring election than ever before, and the managers of the Equal Suffrage association are straining every nerve to call out the largest vote possible. Appeals to the women, especially young women, are published in overy city and town, urging prompt registration and a demonstration of the power of feminine humanity. It is a strange fact that the increased effort on the part of the women suffragists is marked by a corresponding apathy on the past of male voters. Up to the present time there has been no agitation, no canvassing, no excitements over the tickets, except smong the women, who in the small towns are preparing to scoop everything, and in the cities are devoting their attention almost exclusively to capturing the boards of education. It is claimed that the able conduct of affairs where the fair sex has ruled, the entire absence of complaint and the cessation of all talk of corruption in office and turnoil over contracts and appointments are the causes of the apathy of the male population in regard to municipal politics in the villages. The example set there is having its effect in the cities, as is seen in the case of Atchison.

In Arizona, where the only male officer has been the police judge, it is thought the entire Suffragist ticket will be elected this spring. Oskaloosa, for two years under complete Suffragist mayor in Syracuse has won that town over to the cause. Cottonwoof Falls, governed by the Suffragists, except as to police judge, will this year probably elect a straight ticket. Rossville, in this county, has had a satisfactory experience of the Suffragist mayor in Syracuse has won that town over to the cause of the party this spring. In Topeka men will scarcely accept a nomination unless petitioned to do so, and before the election the caudidates of the two parties, especially for the mayoralty, are summoned before the executive committee of the Equal Suffrage association and forced to make a plain statement of their position with regard to "liquor joints" and disreputable houses, which finds its way to the press and places the candidate before the public in his true light. This discourages the chronic office-seeker and disgusts the ward politician, while business men will not bother with city affairs.
