

A VICTIM OF PARALYSIS.

JOHN FISHER, AN OLD MAN OF NORWOOD DIES ON SUNDAY NIGHT.

John Fisher, an old man of Norwood, died on Sunday night, aged 78 years. His death was caused by paralysis after a few days illness. He was a well known fence maker. A wife and several children survive.

John Fisher, an employee of the Columbia Iron company, had a hearing before Squire Hershey on Saturday night on the charge of assault and battery on Michael Dorn. Dorn was passing front and back streets, when Fisher asked "what are you looking at?" He gave a reply, when the squire followed to slap his face. The suit followed and Dorn was held in \$200 for court.

WHO IS HE?

A Man, Who Says He Is From Lancaster, Killed in Salt Lake City.

A copy of the Daily Tribune, published at Salt Lake City, has been received at the INTELLIGENCER office, and it gives the account of a terrible shooting affair in which one man, who says he lives in Lancaster, was fatally injured and another instantly killed.

The alleged Lancaster man's name is Frederick Werner, a German, and he is about 32 years of age. He was born in the old country, but said that his folks reside in this city. He claims to have been in Omaha for some time past, and went to Salt Lake City to make money.

Werner and his friend, who was afterwards recognized as a man named Grandold, a thief, fell in with John C. Weston, of Colorado, a cook who had gone to Salt Lake to make some purchases. When Werner and his friend saw that Weston was a considerable man they attempted to rob him, after giving him drugged whisky. They took him into an old omnibus and there began the robbing operation. Weston was armed with a big knife and a revolver, and after the thieves had taken his clothing, he attempted to steal \$70 in silver, he pulled out a pistol and he put three balls from it into the neck of Werner, whose partner tried to get away. Werner followed him and shot him in the forehead, killing him instantly. After being so terribly wounded Werner was still able to talk, and he said he was a recent pavior and came originally from Bazony.

THE JACOBS CASE.

Sheriff Burkholder to Take Him to the Eastern Penitentiary.

Governor Beaver to-day received from Sheriff Burkholder the official notification of the commutation of the death penalty as to James H. Jacobs to imprisonment for life. The document is signed by the governor and sets forth the conviction of Jacobs on October 10, 1887, his sentence to death on January 23rd, 1888, and the action of the board of pardons on March 13. The sheriff is directed to deliver Jacobs into the custody of the keeper of the Eastern penitentiary, who is to retain him in imprisonment for life.

The sheriff has not yet determined on what day he will take Jacobs to the Eastern penitentiary.

The Electric Railroad.

Work was to have been begun on the electric street railway this morning and it was the intention to make a start at putting up the poles. A large force of men gathered in Centre Square to go to work, but as the poles did not arrive the start was postponed.

She was 47 years of age and a daughter of Samuel Armstrong, the watchman at the Prison, and was the wife of the P. R. R. in this city. She had no children and will be buried in Philadelphia cemetery on Wednesday.

The Barn of a Butcher Destroyed This Afternoon.

People residing in the northern part of the city this afternoon saw a black smoke in the direction of Petersburg.
