STRUCK BY TRAIN.

BENRY CORN INSTANTLY KILLED AT GREEN TREE, ON WEDNESDAY.

While Standing On the Track, a Fast Freight Strikes Him-He Served as Brakeman Over 20 Years.

COLUMBIA, March 27 .- Word was received here last night of the instant death of Henry Cohn, a well known railroad amploye of town, which occurred last night at Green Tree. The German ship Camelia, lust in at New York from Retterdam, is a vessel of over 1,300 tons, and she carries an immense spread of canvas. On leaving Retterdam she took an extreme southerly course to avoid the ice. On the afternoon of February avoid the ice. On the afternoon of February 17, every sail alow and aloft was set and drawing full. Captain Arians was congratulating himself on the vessel's progress when he noticed a heavy black cloud hanging low over the water to the northward. It was rapidly approaching the vessel, and soon the Camelia's crew made out the form of a huge waterspout, which reared itself apparently 200 feet out of the water. The captain decided that it was fully seventy-five feet in diameter at the base. It assumed the shape of an hour glass, and the top was lost to sight in the cloud

and the top was lost to sight in the cloud above it. On it came with a deafening roar like the noise of a dozen big cataracts combined. Captain Arians ordered the light sails taken in, and shortly after the Camelia was bare down to her lower topsails.

was bere down to her lower topsails.

It seemed almost certain that the big waterspout would strike the vessel, and every one on board watched intently. But the ship escaped, for the big, twisting column of water passed barely two ship lengths astern, and such was the suction caused by its passage that the huge sails of the Camelia were slapped back againt her masts, and for a moment threatened to follow the waterspout. The ship trembled, and for some time violently rocked in the big billows in the wake of the spout.

Captain Arians said it was traveling about forty nilles an hour as near as he

about forty miles an hour as near as he could judge. It was a magnificent spectacle, but those on the Camelia enjoyed it better when it had gone thundering by on its way to the southward.
