

DIED SUDDENLY.

MARTIN AMENT'S DEATH OCCURS ON THE FARM OF FRANK SHILOTT.

While Working in the Garden He is Attacked by Apoplexy, and Expires While Being Carried to the House.

COLCHESTER, April 8.—Martin Ament, an elderly resident of town, met with sudden death on Monday at the farm of Frank Shilott, his son-in-law, in West Hempfield township. He was at work in the garden when he fell to the ground. Assistance was given, but he died while being carried to the house of Mr. Shilott. He was brought to town and taken to his home on North Eighth street. Deputy Coroner Hershby empaneled the following jury: John S. Martin, Taylor Gable, George W. Young, Jas. A. Allison, W. H. Lockard and S. Morrison. The verdict was death from apoplexy. He was 64 years of age. The funeral will be held on Thursday morning at 9 o'clock from Holy Trinity Catholic church.

SELECTION COUNCIL ORDINANCE, NO. 6, March 5, 1890. In Select Council Read and Referred to the Street Committee. Same Day Reported Back Affirmatively and Ordered Printed.

An Ordinance Granting the Lancaster City Street Railway Company the Right to Extend Its Tracks from Walnut Street Northward on Line Street to the City Limits and from North Queen Street Eastward on Chestnut Street to the City Limits, and to Operate Electric Motor Cars over the same, and to erect and maintain poles and wires for that purpose.

Be it ordained by the Select and Common Councils of the City of Lancaster, that the Lancaster City Street Railway Company shall have the right to extend its tracks from Walnut street northward on Line street to the city limits, and from North Queen street eastward on Chestnut street to the city limits, and to operate electric motor cars over the same, and erect and maintain poles and wires for that purpose.

That the privileges hereby granted shall be subject to all the provisions, restrictions, limitations and regulations contained in certain ordinances heretofore passed granting similar privileges to the said railway company, and that the work of laying said tracks be commenced within one year from the passage of this ordinance.
