### PLEEING FROM DOOM.

HORANY PANATICS LEAVE A CITY TO ESCAPE A COMING RARTEQUAKE.

be Inhabitants Of a Section of Call-Brain In Pitiable Plight-They Are Made Crasy By Religious Cranks.

An exodus from Oakland, a city containing a population of 60,000, across the bay hear fas Francisco, is in progress, the remails of several month, agitation by sensitional religionists. Mrs. Woodworth, a revivalista, is responsible for the condition of affairs. She came to Oakland last summer with a large tent, in which she held religious meetings until about Christman, and with remarkable power she worked upon the feelings of her hearers until the brains of many were turned. They would all unconscious to the floor, or rave like maniacs, with the result, as the courir records show, that ten or a dozen people were driven to the insane asylum, and many thrown into severe norvous prostration.

When she left town her followers took up her line of sensational argument, and one man named Erickson particularly distinguished himself by declaring that in one of his trances heaven had been opponed before him, and he had been appointed to warn people that on April 14 an earthquake would becur, followed by a tidal wave, which, on account of their wickedness, would destroy San Francisco, Oakland, Alameda, Chicago and Milwankee.

Taking this as his cue, another fanatic well known scross the bay mounted a bisycle cach evening and fled through the siroets, crying "Flee to the mountains and be saved; fly from blood."

These cranks, with others, have purrauded soveral hundred people that the day of doom is at hand. Many have actually sold their houses and real estate and shipped their goods out of Oakland and are leaving by train. Santa Rosa and St. Helens, towns in protected valleys, each report the arrival of more than fifty doom scalers, as the timid ones are styled. oakland. It was foretold that after the 7th inst. no trains could leave and escape would be impossible. They appeared to consider the holding off of the event as a mark of Divine favor and were humbly thankful that they were given additional time to escape. Probably thirty people took the train for the Sierras on Wednesday and many others fled to the hills back of Borkeley.

The example set by the more fervent Woodworthites had stirred up a big rush for the mountains. Tuesday and the day before the departures took more the form of an organized exoaus than ever before. Those who left earlier quietly went aboard the trains separately, one, or possibly two, families to a party. A great many went in this way, and it was estimated on Wednesday that fully three hundred people had left their homes. Not a single person who was prominent at the meetings where the prophecy was first announced was to be found in Oakland. All have fled to the mountains. "We are leaving because God has plainly

"We are leaving because God has plainly revealed the approaching catastrophe and we dare not neglect his warning."

Street Railway Company the Right to Extend

maintain poles and wires for that purpose.
Be it ordained by the Select and Common
Councils of the City of Lancester, that the Lancaster City Street Railway company shall have
the right to extend its tracks from Walnut
street northward on Lime street to the city
limits, and from North Queen sweet eastward
on Chestnut street to the city limits, and to operate electric motor cars over the same, and
erect and maintain poles and wires for that
purpose. purpose.

Provided, That the privileges hereby granted shall be subject to all the provisions, restrictions, limitations and regulations contained in certain ordinances heretofore passed, granting similar privileges to the said railway company, and that the work of laying said tracks be commenced within one year from the passage of this ordinance.
