



In size the tablet is 4 lect 6 inches by 3 feet 6 inches. The outer edge to the depth of six inches, is of Tennessee marble, enclosing the tablet proper, which is of brass. There is a margin of ivy leaves in relief. In each ner is a rosette with a maltese cross. On the tablet are these words "This chapel was erected by Robert A. Evans, to the mory of his beloved mother, Ann Mar-May 7, 1883." The tablet was selected and put into resition by the board of trustees of the church. It is a beautiful piece of work, and was made by the Gorham Manufacturing company of New York. The manufacturers considered it such a handsome piece of work that they had it on exhibition in their window for over three weeks.


