TURNKEY BUTLER INVESTIGATED His Colored Political Club Has No Pur-

His Colored Political Club Has No Further Use For Him.

A meeting of the colored political club of this city was held recently to consider the action of Wm. Butler, the colored appointee to the post of turnkey at the station house by Mayor Clark, who accepted the same contrary to expeciation of the colored people and resigned afterwards.

Butler was called before the club and questioned in reference to his course of section, and after hearing his explanation the committee retired, prepared and reported the following resolutions as their sentiments and the opinion of the colored people:

ported the following resolutions as their sentiments and the opinion of the colored people:

WHEREAS, One Wm. Butler, a colored man, now officialing as barber at the American house, this city, was duly appointed to the position of turnkey by our recently elected mayor, in consideration or political services rendered him by us, and that the said Butler was in a position regarded as a stopping stone to our higher social as well as political advancement.

WHEREAS, Said Butler in accepting a position which he never canvassed, thus defeating competent colored men for the same, and thereby most ignominiously resigning the same within 24 hours of being appointed, which action cast great discredit on our people. Therefore be it

Resolved, That the said Wm. Butler shall be opposed by us in any future political aspirations he should take unto himself, and that he be declared unworthy the respect of all good people, consequent to a traiter of his race.

Resolved, That the said Butler was never recommended to the position he attained by any class of colored people whatever, and, with all due respect, our honorable mayor did not justify the colored people, by virtue of whose votes he was elected, in ignoring the sanctioned ones for the same, and superseding Wm. Butler's resignation accordingly.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded by us and additional copies be transmitted to our daily papers for publication and to the colored press of the state.
