When Auctioneer Haines stepped upon a box to commence the saie the room was packed with people, and several hundred more would have been there had there been room to stand. The place was entirely too small for the crowd. There was the greatest amount of fun during the satire progress of the saie. People were purchasing things that they knew nothing of, and in many cases they paid the highest kind of prices for articles that were entirely worthless. In several instances the purchasers were winners and secured things at much less than their real value. Everybody seems anxious to take their chances and there was the best of feeling. There were some articles, such as a table, a sewing machine, wash basket, that were not boxed or tied up, and they were sold for about what they were supposed to be worth. It was the mysterious bundle that made the fun.

Quite a number of parties made purchasers of packages which they refused to open for fear that they would be cheated and the crowd would laugh at them. Some folks just purchased the packages as a joke and when they opened them

a joke and when they opened them they enjoyed a laugh as well as the others. One men bought a package, which was very nicely tied up, for \$1.75. He was too smart to open it inside of the store, where people would laugh at him, so he went outside only to find that he had given up his good money for a lot of show lithographs. Another man bought a nicely shaped little package for 65 cents, and he was sure that he had secured a prize. When he opened it he found a lot of pamphlets for advertising fertilizers. One man bought a small package for \$1.55 and it contained a beautiful Masonic pin worth much more. A box which looked like those in which suits of clothes are shipped, and was marked for a man at the Everett house. New York, was knocked down for \$1.65. When it was opened the contents were found to be advertisements. One man paid \$3.75 for a small but heavy package marked "C. O. D.," with \$8 to collect. It contained soveral electrotypes, which were not worth five cents to the purchaser. Another man bought a can, which was thought to centain oil, for 75 cents and it had something in it that smelled like spoiled catsup. One large three-cornered box was plut up, and as one end was off it was plain that it contained a pair of steer horns of great size. For these the bidding was lively, and they brought \$3.75.
