The Law Lays Hold.

A very unusual, but very commendable course has been taken in the congressional contest in Philadelphia, where the court has been invoked to command the officers of the Democratic organization to certify to the property elected delegates to the convention.

Before this law was enacted political parties were a law unto themselves and the conduct of their representatives was not subject to the control of the courts. Now they may be held by the court to a proper observance of the rules governing the party and to a fair exercise of their powers.
