There were a number of fights in different parts of the town, the result of too much beer. A fight occurred on South Front street, where blows were freely exchanged and great disorder existed. Another disgraceful affair took place on North Fourth street between a town man and a party from Chestnut Hill. The fight lasted for an hour and the whole neighborhood was aroused. Arrests will follow.

On Sunday night a fight occurred at the house of Harry Woodyard, on South Firth street, in which the participants were colored people. A keg of beer was the cause of the fight. Woodyard found feorge Fields, a colored man from Willesserori working at the saw mill, too intimate with his wife. Woodyard proceeded to belabor Fields over the head with a chair and some ugly gashes show the force of the man's blows. The fight aroused the neighborhood and the street was full of people for a few hours. The affair has resulted in law suits before two of the local squires.
