LANCASTER can proudly claim possession of mud that turns to dust and back again with a rapidity only equalled by the changes of the weather.

By and by, when Lancaster gets a park and the electric street cars begin to operate, the desirability of a few trees along the steep and uncultivated banks of the Conestoga will be generally appreciated.

Mr. BROUSSE, in his tariff essay before Congress, quotes the preamble of a tariff act passed by our state assembly in 1784, in which it is declared that good policy and a regard to the well-being of citizens require that moderate duties be laid on certain manufactures which do not interfere with, and which if no relief be given, will undermine and destroy the useful manufactures of the like kind in this country.

Senator Cockrell moved to omit these big vessels as not called for by the state of peace in which the country exists, as too unwieldy to be useful and as not needed as means of depleting the surplus, which he declares has long ago gone where the woodbine twined, under the legislation of this Congress.

Senator Blair, who has a habit of taking a position afar off from his colleagues, was in favor of this appropriation under conditions. He moved that Great Britain be first requested to withdraw her garrisons from the American continent; upon her failure to move off within a year after notice the New Hampshire sage was ready to vote the biggest appropriation for the biggest ships to put the country in condition to enforce its notions of the right to rule the Americas.

Senator Blair's colleagues plainly told him, but in somewhat softer words, that he was a fool to think that England would take note of such request and to propose that the United States should make it. Mr. Blair's opinion was otherwise. He held that England would see that she had no business over here, and that she was animated by a Christian disposition to promote good will among men.

Underneath the seeming folly of Senator Blair's motion there is a story of sense. The appropriation for the battle ships is advanced upon the ground that the country should be ready. No present need is claimed. No foe but England is considered. Collision with her is held to be among the possibilities of the future, because her flag floats near us and her land joins us.

Not being expert in naval warfare our opinion as to the lack of value to us of armored line of battle ships is held modestly, nevertheless it seems to need strong reasons to justify this service, to compensate for their lack of use, and it especially calls for the record of one notable deed done by one of these modern Leviathans to the honor of the class.
